YEARLY REPORT OF OPERATION FOR 2003

Medina City Council & Mayor Medina County Commissioners

The following is the yearly report of operations of the Court as required by Ohio Revised Code Sec. 1901.14.

The Court received new filings of 19,161 cases and terminated 19,797 cases.

This case load generated \$4,676,458.23 of disbursements, which include bond accounts and civil judgments. Driving under the influence of alcohol (O.V.I.) charges increased to 947 in 2003 from 746 in 2002, 856 in 2001 and 840 in 2000.

Brunswick Mayor's Court, which is in our court's jurisdiction, had 4,057 traffic cases filed, 221 O.V.I. cases filed, and 927 criminal cases filed for a total of 5,205 cases. Three Hundred and twenty-three of these entered not guilty pleas and were transferred to Medina Municipal Court.

Among the significant events affecting the work of the Court during the calendar year of 2003 are the following:

NEED FOR NEW BUILDING AND SECOND MUNICIPAL JUDGE

The building for the Medina Municipal Court was completed in 1983 after a fire set by a disgruntled defendant destroyed the previous location. Judge Dale H. Chase has served as Judge since 1988. There is one judge elected to serve this court.

The jurisdiction of the Medina Municipal Court includes the City of Brunswick, the City of Medina, Spencer and Chippewa Lake Villages, and the Townships of Brunswick Hills, Chatham, Granger, Hinckley, Lafayette, Litchfield, Liverpool, Medina, Montville, Spencer and York. The Medina County Planning Commission estimates the current population of the Court's jurisdiction at 122,800.

The most recently available statistics from the Ohio Supreme Court (Ohio Courts Summary – 2002) indicate that the average caseload for each municipal judge in Ohio is 13,157. There are 20 municipal courts in Ohio served by two judges. These courts had an average population of 100,384 (50,192 per judge) and an average total caseload of 24,394 (12,197 cases per judge).

The existing facility, staff and number of judges is not adequate to meet the present and reasonably expected future needs of this jurisdiction. A second judge and a new facility are a necessity.

The position of a municipal judge is an elected position, which must be created by the Ohio General Assembly on the recommendation of the Ohio Supreme Court. This process can only

proceed when we have committed as a community to construct an adequate facility to house a second judge plus the necessary staff to handle the caseload of the court.

On crowded mornings people sit on the floor in the small court lobby. There is not enough parking for the people who drive to court along with space for court staff. There is no security screening of people entering the building.

There is no holding cell or secure location for prisoners. Prisoners are escorted through crowds in the lobby, through staff areas, and near the judge's office.

Attorneys must meet with their clients in the halls or outside the building because there are no private locations available.

January 1, 2001, Judge Chase assessed an additional court cost of \$10.00 per case (increased to \$20.00 beginning January 1, 2002) to help cover a portion of the cost of a new building. This means that part of the cost for this facility will be paid for by people convicted of criminal and traffic offenses and by participants in civil cases before the court. From 2003 operations this cost generated \$300,773.50. The balance on December 31, 2003 was \$521,195.46.

PROBATION DEPARTMENT

The probation department continued to serve the court with three full time standard probation officers, a part time officer, a full time intensive supervision probation officer, a chief probation officer and one full time and one part time secretary.

Collectively, the department completed nearly 1,400 presentence investigations and prepared information on over 2,000 additional cases for sentencing. Seven hundred thirty-seven new defendants were placed on probation. Fifty-seven percent of the new probation cases were for a first, second or third operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol offense. Ten percent were for underage alcohol comsumption, 7% were for an offense of violence. The remaining 19% were for an assortment of criminal offenses including petty theft, disorderly conduct, resisting arrest, menacing and others.

Active cases averaged 1,448 for the year. Seventy-four individuals faced formal probation violations. Nearly 3,300 reporting appointments were held and 1,146 drug screens were completed. Probationers continued to be referred to local substance abuse treatment and counseling agencies. 2112 hours of community service were completed as a condition of probation. Probation staff assisted in monitoring 114 offenders who were each ordered to complete 30 or more days of electronically monitored house arrest. The probation department also completed sealing of record investigations on 53 cases.

All full time officers completed training at The American Probation and Parole Association's National Training Institute which was held in Cleveland, Ohio in late August, 2003.

All staff worked out of a single room for nearly two months (July-September) while extensive flood damage was repaired in the probation offices. Normal operations of the probation department were uninterrupted in spite of these very unusual working conditions.

The Intensive Supervision Probation Program received 100% on its annual performance audit from the State of Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Corrections for the second year in a row.

COMPUTER DEVELOPMENTS

The court employs a Management Information Specialist to coordinate all technology applications. The current equipment in place consists of 37 printers and 42 PC's. An IBM RS6000 holds the court records, while two IBM X Series servers handle the online court access and protect the system as a firewall. All systems are standardized to Office 2000 Professional Version, and the Enterprise version of Norton Antivirus. The installed value of computers and

software is approximately \$320,000, of which zero dollars came from the City of Medina General Fund.

The criminal/traffic department began scanning historical records into the imaging database in the 1st quarter of 2003. This imaging database allows documents to be stored in digital format and printed on demand. This increases the efficiency of the department, prevents misplaced files, saves clerical time in retrieving the files, and reduces the space required for storing the files.

The court experienced a flood in July requiring major reconstruction of the lower level clerks office and probation office. The extensive damage to the work environment required moving the probation office to an open unfinished room on the lower level while repairs were completed. All the files, desks, telephones and computers were relocated. The carpet, drywall, 3 pc's and 2 power supplies were lost. The repairs required coordination with many contractors and the City's Service Director. The City applied for and was awarded a FEMA disaster grant to assist in the repairs. The first step in the repair process was to dry out the wet material and suppress the production of mold and mildew. Following approval of the FEMA grant, contractors replaced the carpet with non-skid tile and repaired the damaged drywall. The walls were repainted and all the molding replaced. The probation department was moved back to their offices after repairs were made. The final step was to completely clean the HVAC ductwork to remove the contaminants. The lower level clerks office continued operation working around the repair work. No records were lost in the flood and court operation continued without interruption.

Additional scan stations were added to the Clerk's office in preparation for scanning court documents for records retention. Laser printers were placed on each clerk's desk to reduce traffic and improve efficiency.

The IT specialist attended the Court Technology Conference sponsored by The National Center for State Courts held in Kansas City, MO in October this year. The conference consists of court and technology oriented workshops covering all aspects of court operation. Particularly relevant this year was the "after the fact" coverage of disaster planning. The conference is held every two years to update court personnel on the latest technology and standards available to the court. The emphasis is on efficiency, security, reducing expenditures and greater access to the court.

VIDEO ARRAIGNMENTS

Arraignments (initial appearances in criminal and traffic cases) are conducted by the magistrates. In 1997, the Court began conducting these proceedings via remote video link with the Medina County Jail. This continues to work well not only for security reasons but also saving police departments many person hours by not having to transport prisoners from the jail to the Court. The remote video process is less disruptive to other litigants and witnesses who are waiting to appear before the magistrate for other cases. Security at the courthouse is improved because unruly defendants remain in custody at the jail and pose no risk to court staff or the public.

FOREIGN LANGUAGE INTERPRETING SERVICE

In the past few years, we have seen an increase in the number of criminal and traffic cases involving defendants who either do not speak English, or who need assistance in their native language in order to understand the court proceedings. The court contracted with Language Line Services of Monterey, California to provide language translation for short court proceedings (about 5 to 10 minutes), and with Monarca Language Services, a Medina business, for othe translation services.

CLERK'S OFFICE

In 2003 the records for 2002 were audited. The Court had an excellent audit. Clerk of Courts Judy L. Schwartz continues to be active in both the Northeast Ohio Municipal Court Clerk's Association and in the Ohio Municipal Court Clerk's Association, to meet the requirements for the Continuing Certification Program.

The clerk's office had another very busy year training new personnel and implementing procedures as the laws continue to change. The majority of the clerks are being cross-trained so they can do several different positions in the clerk's office. There are 10 full time deputy clerks and 1 chief deputy clerk. We now have 4 deputy clerks trained to work civil and small claims. One who does microfilming and scanning three days a week and works in the civil division two days a week. In 2003 16,807 cases were microfilmed, 2,108 cases were scanned and 17,481 cases were shredded.

In 2003 the clerk's office started reporting criminal dispositions to the Bureau of Criminal Investigation by computer. Individual printers were installed on each Deputy Clerks desk saving them time by not having to leave their desks every time they print a form. The clerk and the chief deputy clerk spent many hours updating the computer with the new violations for operating a vehicle under the influence of alcohol and driving under suspension violation codes and suspension classes.

CUSTODIAN

The court's full-time custodian has been very busy this past year with the flooding on the lower level of the court in July, causing extensive damage to the Probation Department and

the clerks/computer/court reporters offices while continuing to maintain the interior and exterior of the building and grounds. The custodian continues to order all his own supplies and help with deliveries to all areas of the building. The high volume of people coming through the building requires constant attention to maintain a clean facility.

COURT REPORTER

The Medina Municipal Court currently employs one court reporter who is responsible for maintaining a record of all proceedings held before the Judge. All proceedings are stenographically recorded by the Court Reporter and are recorded on paper as well as computer disk for storage and maintenance. There is also a log kept and maintained by the Court Reporter of all proceedings held before the Judge.

Proceedings in front of the Magistrate are recorded electronically via videotape and the Court Reporter is responsible for the maintenance of the videotape log and the filing of all videotape proceedings.

The Court Reporter is also responsible for producing transcripts, when requested, and the preparation and filing of transcripts on appeal.

The Court Reporter is an active member of the Ohio Court Reporters Association and the National Court Reporters Association which provides information and seminars on court reporting issues and education.

BAILIFF'S OFFICE

In 2003, the court employed Bailiff William Saus and four Deputy Bailiffs, Carl Meding, Curt Bell, part-time Brett Robinson and part-time outside bailiff Dave Rizzo.

The bailiff's office is responsible for a variety of duties as outlined in Section 1901.32 of the Ohio Revised Code, and additional responsibilities as prescribed by the Judge.

In 2003, the bailiff's office handled various day to day operational tasks including court security, docket management, civil and criminal process service, jury trials, specific court orders and bench warrants.

In terms of training, the bailiff and deputy bailiffs successfully completed the annual firearms qualifications held at Rittman Police range. Deputy Bailiff Carl Meding attended L.E.A.D.S. continuing education in his capacity as the court's Terminal Agency Coordinator.

The bailiff's office continued its affiliation with the Ohio Bailiffs & Court Officers Association. In 2003, Bailiff Carl Meding, who as Warrant Officer follows up on cases in which warrants have been issued, resolved 559 warrants on criminal, traffic and civil cases. Of the 532 traffic/criminal warrants resolved by Bailiff Meding, about 57% were issued because the defendant did not pay fine and costs ("F & C") as ordered. Over 80% of the time, these F & C warrants are concluded by the defendant paying the entire amount that is owed to the court. In 2003, the court collected \$120,613.36 from these warrants.

ALCOHOL TREATMENT FUNDS AND JAIL COSTS

In 2003 the Court collected \$20,930.50 in fines for the Indigent Drivers Alcohol Treatment Act. These fines can be used to pay for treatment of indigent defendants. The Court also collected \$44,839.00 for Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol Jail Costs, which was paid to the Medina County Auditor. The Court disbursed to Townships, Cities, and the State of Ohio a total of

\$20,232.00 under the Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol Act, which arresting agencies can use for equipment, training and enforcement of driving under the influence of alcohol laws.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND OTHER CRIMINAL CASES

In 2003 there were 165 domestic violence cases filed compared to 148 in 2002 and 168 in 2001.

The domestic violence law passed by The Ohio General Assembly effective December 9, 1994, established a State policy that the "preferred course of action" in a domestic violence incident is arrest and requires county, city, village and township law enforcement agencies to have written domestic violence policies and procedures for these cases.

Underage consumption of alcohol cases decreased to 100 in 2003 from 162 in 2002 and 248 in 2001. Drug paraphernalia cases decreased to 58 in 2003 compared to 227 in 2002 and 393 in 2001.

WEDDINGS

In 2003 the Judge performed 72 weddings compared to 82 weddings in 2002 and 102 weddings in 2001.




